A MESSAGE FROM DAVID BEHRING



Dear Friends,

Our feature story in this newsletter is about three volunteers who have worked tirelessly to raise funds on our behalf. Don and Josh Routh and Bill Wheeler have traveled to 20 countries to give out wheelchairs and increase awareness about the need for wheelchairs to tens of thousands of local students of all ages. I have had the pleasure of both knowing them as friends for two decades and the honor of traveling with them in Latin America and Vietnam.

There is no question that, when one of your traveling volunteers has spent his life in a wheelchair, his presence greatly affects the insight and perspective of other travelers, volunteers and recipients. I witnessed this change with both young people and adults. At the beginning of a wheelchair distribution trip Don Routh will talk about the challenges and rewards of raising a child with disabilities and about how he always encouraged Josh to be independent. Josh would then talk about his life and travels abroad which taught us about the lack of curbs and elevators, stairs, bathroom access, transportation problems and other issues most of us don't think about. After watching how Josh handled the physical demands of traveling to a developing country and how well he interacted with the recipients, the group travelers would comment on "the personable, inspirational leadership and bonding friendship provided by Josh".

There is one ritual between father and son that never changed during their 37 trips together. When they finished dinner, they would recap the day's events and conclude with this emotional exchange:

"Dad, we did miracles today."

"Josh, we don't do miracles. Only God does. We just do good stuff."

On behalf of the Wheelchair Foundation, I want to thank Don, Josh and Bill for all of the "good stuff" they have done for 20 years and for teaching the "spirit of mobility" to so many tens of thousands of our students.

Supporting Operation Free Ride and Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra




Our modern electronic world allows us to respond to local domestic need quicker than ever. Text messaging has replaced the multiple phone calls and voicemail messages of the past, and coordinating a response to a request for wheelchairs has become easier.

When our friend and longtime supporter, Kay Collier, reaches out with an identified need for wheelchairs, we are happy to respond. Disabled Sports Eastern Sierra (DSES) put out the text "call" for wheelchairs for their "Operation Free Ride" which provides access and short-term wheelchair use at numerous locations free-of-charge. DSES provides adaptive sports and therapeutic outdoor recreation for people of all ages with disabilities as well as supporting the National Wounded Warrior Center at Mammoth Lakes, California. This work allows those who would otherwise not have the chance, opportunities to learn and achieve their outdoor recreation goals.

We strive to support the access to mobility wherever it is needed, and are honored when we get to answer the "text message" for help from anyone seeking to enjoy the beautiful California great outdoors.

TRES AMIGOS CON CORAZON! (THREE FRIENDS WITH HEART)



his is a tale about a father, his son and their friend who, together, heard Ken Behring make a speech about the Wheelchair Foundation, then decided to not only raise funds for the organization, but also to personally travel and distribute those wheelchairs to the people who need them. During the last 18 years these "Tres Amigos Con Corazon" have accomplished the following incredible feats:

- They have been instrumental in sponsoring over 17,000 wheelchairs (62 containers)
- Made 37 trips outside the United States delivering wheelchairs, and
- Personally gave out wheelchairs in 20 countries (18 in Latin America along with Uganda and Vietnam)

The story begins with Josh Routh, Don's son, who has cerebral palsy and has spent most of his 37 years in a wheelchair. From an early age, Don made sure he could provide whatever therapy Josh needed and endeavored to make him feel not "disabled," but rather face his future with a positive outlook, a desire to help others and a strong willingness to reach his goals and overcome any obstacles along the way. Josh has worked for over 20 years at the same grocery store, saved his money to purchase a car and lived independently. He has never been afraid to travel to a less developed country where ADA rules don't exist.

Josh is recognized as the first wheelchair user to achieve the following miletones:

- Reached the base of the Serrano Glacier at the southern tip of Chile;
- Climbed the steps in his wheelchair to the Temple of the Sun at Machu Picchu in Peru;
- Was carried up a long, steep and muddy path in Uganda to spend time with the gorillas; and
- Traveled by canoe to a remote village in Panama with 157 indigenous inhabitants where he was carried by four young men, up 72 steps, to meet the Chief and receive an honorary knife, after giving one of their paralyzed members a wheelchair.

When the recipients and their families see Josh come into a venue, there is an instantaneous sense of seeing an American in a wheelchair. His empathy for them, his warm smile and the twinkle in his eye act as a magnet and Josh will not leave until he hugs or shakes hands with all of the people needing a wheelchair that day. On our Vietnam trip in late 2019, one of our Veterans on the trip, Joe Callaway, described Josh's indelible imprint more articulately than I could: "Josh's unwavering personal strength, kind gentle spirit, perseverance and positive attitude made us all better, more thoughtful and tolerant travelers. We started looking for the better angels within ourselves, and elevated our trip with a sense of harmony and good will. We were all humbled and proud to be called Josh's Friend."

The apple certainly doesn't fall far from the tree. After Don spent a long and successful career with PriceWaterhouseCoopers where he was a Partner living and working in different parts of the world, he retired and became a strong advocate for people with disabilities. Don has served on numerous non-profit Boards over the years and helped push legislation through in California to insure early intervention services for children with disabilities. In 2005, Don began supporting the Wheelchair Foundation and took Josh on his first wheelchair distribution trip to Mexico. They have never looked back and have made it part of their mission in life to personally provide mobility, freedom and independence to as many people as possible. Don contributed an enormous amount of his own resources and reached out to friends, business associates, Rotary clubs and other organizations to help fund 62 containers of wheelchairs.





Don is a big man with an even bigger heart. He is known to become emotional during distributions and he cannot stand to see someone deprived of a wheelchair. The next two stories illustrate his compassion. "In 2017, in Uganda, a man crawled to the distribution, quietly watched and listened and then crawled away when it was over because he was not on the list of recipients. Josh and I could not get the image out of our minds. We contacted our Rotarian hosts in Uganda and told them that if they could find this gentleman we would raise another \$42,000 for another container of wheelchairs for them. Sure enough they found him and he later received one of our wheelchairs.









"A few years earlier, in El Salvador, Don's group came across a man, named Eduardo, in an old wheelchair going down a road with his family. They found out that when Eduardo had a doctor's appointment three miles from their home, his son would walk to the clinic, borrow a wheelchair and take it three miles back. The family would then put their father in it, make the three-mile journey, return home with him and then take the wheelchair back to the clinic. All told it was an 18-mile process. Don took a spare wheelchair out of the van and presented it to Eduardo and his family. Needless to say, it was an emotional moment for everyone."

The third amigo, Bill Wheeler, is a true entrepreneur who created one of the most successful transportation companies in northern California after beginning his career as a limousine driver. He learned about our organization through Rotary. Bill delivered his first wheelchair in Tulancingo, Mexico, in 2002 and made two more trips to Chile before recruiting Don and Josh to become his traveling companions. You will be hardpressed to find someone more fun-loving, adventurous, gregarious and compassionate than Bill. It never takes him long to make friends in foreign countries – especially during his motorcycle trips when he schedules to stop at wheelchair distribution ceremonies. Known for his laugh and story telling ability, Bill loves to socialize and spend quality time with the recipients and their families. He also acts as Josh's right hand man – particularly when traversing difficult terrain.

The Amigos launched "From the Heart – Del Corazon" Schools Program in 2013. In an age rife with social media bullying, they wanted to sensitize students to the issues faced by people with intellectual, developmental and physical disabilities. They have introduced a disabilities awareness curriculum to more than 70 schools in the U.S. and abroad and reached more than 150,000 students and 4000 teachers. Students learn to create their own year-long fundraising projects and then travel during the summer and help provide wheelchairs to recipients. The 12th From the Heart - Student/Teacher trip will be to Ecuador, this July. They will work alongside local Rotarians, practice their Spanish and learn about Ecuadorian food and culture, and most importantly, provide mobility for 280 Ecuadorians in need.

The favorite part of each trip for "Tres Amigos" is "Special Moments" on the final night before they return home. Each traveler will share a treasured story or experience from the week. Tears of sadness will flow as they recount heartbreaking stories about how disease, violence or accidents had immobilized a recipient. There would also be smiles and tears of joy as they described the hugs and warm handshakes they received from the recipients and family members for transforming a life.

You can see now why we are proud to bestow the "Spirit of Mobility" award on Don, Josh and Bill. They are extraordinarily dedicated volunteers and have used their hearts to improve the world in so many different ways.

YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

ast October 23rd, a flurry of e-mail back-and-forth touched off an effort to transport 25 wheelchairs to the island of Grand Bahama. Stephen Gunn from the Rotary Club of Freeport, had received requests for wheelchairs for individuals and families impacted by the devastation wrought by hurricane Dorian, in September of 2019. Efforts had been put forth to supply hundreds of wheelchairs, but the process, from funding to actually getting a container of wheelchairs to Grand Bahama, would take months – if not half the year.

Stephen called Jack Drury in Ft. Lauderdale, and arrangements were made by Wheelchair Foundation Florida to provide 25 wheelchairs as soon as possible. Soon, five pallets of five wheelchairs each were wrapped and prepped for shipment. The five pallets were delivered to the Center for Independent Living of Broward, to Brian Johnson. Brian and Jack Drury are long time friends and have a history of helping people in need of mobility, together. Brian is a wheelchair rider himself, and understands the difficulty facing those who need wheelchairs for daily mobility, but without a wheelchair to use.

Brian and his staff worked their magic, patiently navigating a difficult scenario dealing with Covid-19 and its effects on all processes, including international shipping of durable medical goods. By mid-December everything seemed to come together and the wheelchairs began their journey.

Today we are happy to report that the first wheelchair has been provided to a waiting recipient. Mrs. Grant, a 45-year-old multiple stroke victim, received a wheelchair. This wheelchair will help her husband with his caretaker duties, assisting and tending to his wife's needs. Mr. Grant has been unable to return to work following hurricane Dorian, and the family is without the means to acquire a wheelchair on their own.

Thank you for the efforts of all involved. Keep up the good work and stay safe!

ike a great deal of America, we spent our Spring cooped up at home, missing friends and camaradeire, and wanting to somehow help others during this pandemic. On Thursday, February 25th, we took a step into the live-virtual-event world and hosted "Wine and Cuisine for the Cause."

CONTINUING RELIEF FOR HAITI









ear the end of February 2020, the Rotary Club of Naples, Florida funded 280 wheelchairs for the people of southern Haiti. By May the wheelchairs had been manufactured and were in transit from Asia to Haiti, a journey that would take until late September.

The Rotary Club of Naples has a long history of helping others and focuses on core needs like promoting peace, health initiatives, education and clean water, as well as providing wheelchairs and assisting with their distribution. The Club's extensive work in the Caribbean has fostered some very good partnerships with likeminded organizations. For their work in Haiti they have partnered with *Hope for Haiti*, a Naples, Florida, based NGO with almost 40 years of experience in the often forgotten and lesser-served areas of southern Haiti.

This shipment of wheelchairs was prompted in response to continuing accounts of need for those effected by Hurricane *Matthew* in 2016, a storm which displaced 35,000 people, leaving them homeless. This shipment would also arrive following Tropical Storm *Laura*, which struck Haiti on August 20, 2020. Tropical Storm *Laura* hit Haiti with 50 mile-per-hour winds and destroyed thousands of homes, left some 700,000 without power, and 1.5 million without clean drinking water. By the time it made landfall in the United States, on the coast of Louisiana, Laura would be recorded as a Category 4 hurricane, the strongest to hit land since the 1865 *Last Island* Hurricane.

Les Cayes, Haiti, is a city of nearly 80,000 on the southern coast of the island. The city is at the mouth of Ravine du Sud river and is the home of *Fondation Tous Ensemble Rehabilitation Center* (FONTEN). Since 2001, efforts to provide prosthetic and orthotic services for disabled citizens have grown through international support. *Medical Teams International* trained and worked alongside staff and eventually passed resources and responsibility to FONTEN in 2016.

Today the clinic serves 16,000 patients annually and provides physical rehabilitation treatment and therapy as well as prosthetics, orthotics and patient support. The doctors, clinicians and staff are primarily Haitian and understand the necessity of community outreach and personal contact, so they offer a variety of mobile outreach and access opportunities including in-home services and disability rights advocacy. Haiti is a country where congenital defects are more common than the developed world. Efforts have been made to bolster limited local and national resources and as social awareness and normalization continue, those who need mobility devices, like wheelchairs, are finally receiving them.

Thank you to all involved in this effort to provide mobility to those who would otherwise go unnoticed, unserved and continuing to hope for help.

WHEELCHAIRS FOR RURAL AFRICA

HEDCO REACHES OUT TO THE PEOPLE OF THE TARANGIRE-MANYANA REGION OF TANZANIA
