A MESSAGE FROM DAVID BEHRING



Dear Friends,

Disaster. We normally think of the natural type which can be an earthquake, tornado, hurricane, tsunami, flood or fire. Wheelchair Foundation has responded to the increased need for wheelchairs caused by these events because of injuries, loss of a previous wheelchair or damage to an entire facility. The severity of damage in the less developed countries is usually owed to inadequately constructed buildings which collapse on top of the occupants. We witnessed this in Bam, Iran in 2003 and in Tangshan, China in 1976 in which over 85% of all buildings were damaged with more than 200,000 injuries. More recently we saw the extensive damage caused by the 7.1 earthquake in Haiti which left over 300,000 people injured. Our organization sent thousands of new wheelchairs to these countries to both replace destroyed or lost wheelchairs and to provide wheelchairs to the new people who lost limbs or were paralyzed due to falling debris. My brother Jeff and his group, *Plane to Haiti*, saw this first-hand as they delivered wheelchairs and other medical supplies within a week after this massive quake devastated the country. Hurricane Katrina was one of the largest natural disasters in our country's history and we helped out by shipping 3000 wheelchairs to the Gulf Region.

Now we are confronted with a man-made disaster: Putin's invasion of Ukraine with its relentless shelling, bombing and missile strikes on cities across the country. Hospitals, schools, apartment buildings, elderly care facilities and theatres are not spared. In addition to the hundreds of thousands injured in these brutal attacks, over 7 million people have been displaced with two-thirds of that number physically leaving Ukraine as refugees. Five million have fled to Poland while 750,000 entered Romania and almost 500,000 now call Moldova their temporary home. This is "a humanitarian crisis within a crisis" for the 2,700,000 physically disabled people because they have little evacuation support and they face daunting obstacles such as crowded train stations, buses and underground shelters. Wheelchair Foundation is currently in the process of shipping 500 wheelchairs to Romania and one container (half of which are specialized pediatric wheelchairs) to Ukraine. We hope soon to have partners in Poland and you can designate "Ukrainian Refugees" on any contribution you make to Wheelchair Foundation so we can do more.

Mission and Goals

Our Mission

The Wheelchair Foundation is a nonprofit organization leading an international effort to create awareness of the needs and abilities of people with physical disabilities, to promote the joy of giving, create global friendship, and to deliver a wheelchair to every child, teen and adult in the world who needs one, but cannot afford one. For these people, the Wheelchair Foundation delivers Hope, Mobility and Freedom.

Our Goal

The Wheelchair Foundation aims to deliver wheelchairs to people who cannot afford to buy one, and to further the awareness that a wheelchair is no longer an unaffordable relief option for delivery to developing countries around the world.

Mobility

Since its establishment on June 13, 2000, the Wheelchair Foundation has witnessed hundreds of thousands of examples of how mobility creates independence and new possibilities for recipients and their families. A mobile child is able to attend school. A mobile adult is able to get a job and provide for their family, or care for the children at home so the spouse can work. An elderly person can rejoin society or family activities after years of staying in a bed. The joy and hope that a simple mobility device can deliver is what gives people a new outlook on life and hope for the future.

Located north of Maun, Elephant Haven fosters elephants and trains care-takers. Longtime Wheelchair Foundation supporter Kay Collier was instrumental in making this donation happen. Along with 287 wheelchairs, Elephant Haven supports schools with uniforms, safe transport to-and-from school for students, water wells, community education and the creation of jobs for locals. During one of many wheelchair distribution efforts in Peru this Spring, volunteers happened across a previous wheelchair recipient who had gotten 'good use' out of her chair. The wheelchair she was riding had been gifted to her by students from the *From The Heart Schools Program*. In early December of 2021 I was offered the opportunity to travel to El Salvador to represent Wheelchair Foundation and distribute wheelchairs to local Veterans. El Salvador was the scene of a 12-year civil war, which cost about 75,000 lives, and was finally brought to a close in 1992. El Salvador is beset with one of the world's highest homicide rates and pervasive criminal gangs. Great strides are being made to improve conditions for all and move the country forward.

The delivery was directed by the president of the Board of Directors of INABVE (*Administrator Institute of the Benefits*

of Veterans and Ex-combatants) and ad honorem president of *The Fund for the Protection of the Crippled and Disabled as a Consequences of the Armed Conflict* (FOPROLYD), Eng. Juan Alberto Ortiz Hernández, within the framework of *The National and International Day of the Person with Disability*. The donation, which was made at the Parque Cuscatlán facilities in San Salvador, was attended by friendly organizations such as the Wheelchair Foundation, Kiwanis El Salvador, Airline Ambassadors and the Embassy of the United States, who support the efforts that institutions such as FOPROLYD provide for people with disabilities in El Salvador.



“A wheelchair is one of the means of assistance used to improve personal mobility, a precondition for enjoying human rights and a dignified life, which also helps people with disabilities to become more productive members of their families and communities; therefore, a wheelchair can be the first step towards inclusion and participation in our society”

FOPROLYD is an autonomous government institution responsible for the care and monitoring of the rehabilitation process, productive reinsertion, the timely granting of economic and in-kind benefits to people who were injured and disabled as a result of the armed conflict that took place in El Salvador; as well as the relatives of combatants who died in said conflict, who lost their family protection, through the delivery of the benefits contemplated in the Benefit Law for the Protection of the Wounded and Disabled as a Consequence of the Armed Conflict.

Thank you to all involved in making this possible, with special thanks to Airline Ambassadors, the Denton Program and US Army Southern Command - who transported for this aid in support of efforts of the government of El Salvador.

SPARKING JOY ON GRAND BAHAMA WITH **CHAIR** **THE LOVE** AND ROYALTY

"The hurricanes last year have turned our Bahamian Islands upside down, and we have desperate need for wheelchairs."

We got the e-mail back in November 2020, right in the teeth of Covid-19. Due to the pandemic and logistics difficulties we were unable to respond, but we could feel the desperation in their message.

The note came from the area Rotarians on Grand Bahama. Rotarians, who are always willing to help and partner with Chair the Love worldwide, to assist us in providing mobility to the neediest. Unable to ignore their plea, our generous donors pulled together funds, combined with resources from the Wheelchair Foundation, to purchase an entire container of Wheelchairs (280) to be delivered directly from the factory in Asia to the Bahamas.

Covid restrictions discouraged large crowds and gatherings, so the chairs were given out one-by-one at the homes of the recipients. Our Rotarian friends provided Chair the Love with a continual stream of photos of the distribution process, each one more touching than the last.

One of the distributions resulted in two wheelchairs winding up at The Grand Bahama Children's Home in Freeport. Since it was established in 1977 by the local community, the home has cared for over 900 children, and provides a loving home environment to vulnerable youth who are not able to live with their families. Currently it is home to around 30 kids ranging in age from one-year-old to 17-years-of-age. It is at the Children's Home that our donated wheelchair, and its dear young rider, met Prince William, Duke of Cambridge.

It seems that the Duke, together with Duchess Kate, were in the Bahamas for a goodwill tour of several Commonwealth countries in the Caribbean. Evidently, Prince William was taken with this young man and his joy. The story and photos were featured on Yahoo and Fox News.

This chance meeting serves to underscore the potential that each one of our donors has to change the lives of others, mostly outside the purview of a Duke and Duchess. The smiling faces we see at every wheelchair distribution are due to our donor's generosity. We will give thousands more of that very same gift throughout this year.

This year is busy already! In March, we partnered with the Richard Harris Law Firm and held a public distribution of wheelchairs at their offices in Las Vegas. We were happy to help those who arrived and received new wheelchairs.

Beginning of April, Nevada Wheelchair Foundation received a shipment of 600 wheelchairs. A very big thank you to our volunteers who showed up to assist in unloading these wheelchairs for the good folks of the State of Nevada. It is not an easy job unloading an ocean freight container of wheelchairs, let alone two! Rotary, Elks, Lions and our friends from the A7FL - American 7s Football League, we could not have accomplished this without your help.

We want you to know that we have been able to help people from all walks of life. The impact that this type of work has on community is incredibly important, and the chance to connect with, and help, people in need is deeply fulfilling work. If you can see a clear path to help someone, follow it!

He was homeless at the time of his assault. His sister reached out to Nevada Wheelchair Foundation and we were able to provide Cleve with a free wheelchair and other resources to help with this most difficult situation. >>> Teodoro, a 52-year-old gentleman, could not have been more grateful, or appreciative. As you can see, his right leg has been amputated just below his knee. What you don't see is an open wound on his left foot that will not heal. For economic reasons he lives with his son. At age 52 he has no Medicare, or insurance of any kind. Other resources available to him are limited, to say the least. He is undocumented, and thus has difficulty receiving any aid. However, Teodoro is a perfect example of those we are here to help. -Brock Fraser, Nevada Wheelchair Foundation volunteer >>>

CONTINUING IN THE SPIRIT OF KENNETH E. BEHRING HEDCO AND CFT PROVIDING WHEELCHAIRS IN RURAL TANZANIA

In the midst of our distribution, we found Eda Charlo, in her small hut where she was hidden for many years. In some African communities, disabled people are taken to be a *bad omen*. Often, babies with a physical deformity or disability are killed during, or shortly after, birth, while others are hidden away from society, not to be seen.



Conservation Foundation Trust is conducting outreach to disabled persons in rural Tanzania. CFT is the distribution partner for Wheelchair Foundation and HEDCO. We recently traveled in the Rukwa Region, bordering the Katavi National Park in southwestern Tanzania and Longido District in the north.

In the villages we visited in Rukwa Region we encountered many birth defects and many of the people here suffer from polio. Because of rural isolation, poor sanitation and difficulty with education, these conditions are more common here. Locals often prefer holistic and traditional treatment and some still believe a lot in Witch-crafting for cures to disease.

Eda Charlo was so puzzled at our arrival. She could not believe that she was now the owner of a brand-new red wheelchair. She was very apprehensive to even sit on the wheelchair. Then, as we wheeled her away from her bed, you could see the excitement and astonishment in her eyes. Eda had not been outside of her hut, and everything seemed to be new to her. This experience was a *surprise*, because she had not seen the world right outside her own door!

In northern Tanzania, near the Kenyan border, we held a wheelchair distribution at Longido, the town that serves as the administrative seat of Longido District. The town sits at the base of Mount Longido and borders the Mount Longido Forest Reserve. Most of the inhabitants here are Maasai, but there are other East African Tribes represented as well.

On behalf of HEDCO, CFT was able to distribute additional wheelchairs to disabled people in Mto Wa Mbu, bordering Monduli Juu Open Area. Our community support is part of a partnership with the local villages to conserve the natural resources, and ensure that they receive tangible benefits from the sustainable use of wildlife in the protected areas. Delivering wheelchairs to these communities and villages, as well as providing other services, reinforces the benefits of our fellow Tanzanian's conservation efforts.

Her mother used to carry her to school each morning, and take her back every evening. With the gift of a wheelchair, now her mother can continue with her chores, and Mwasi's friends come get her and are very delighted to wheel her away. >>>



"When a child with a disability gets a wheelchair, they and their loved ones gain freedom. The person with the disability no longer has to be confined to a room or depend on their caretakers for mobility. HEDCO and Wheelchair Foundation, through Conservation Foundation Tanzania, did that to us, and we are so grateful," said parents of a young recipient in Longido.

ROTARY DISTRICT 6960 WHEELCHAIRS FOR PERU

On October 21, at 11 am, the San Borja Sur Rotary with its Past President Luis Enrique Malaga Agüero and Presidents Fanny Collantes and Sivia Espinoza, fulfilled the "Dreams on Wheels" program, by delivering 149 wheelchairs to people with limited resources and to the Home of the Beatitudes in Tablada de Lurín. Patients from the Police Hospital - dialysis area, and residents of Villa María del Triunfo district of Lima, also received wheelchairs.

On Thursday, May 21, the San Borja Sur Rotary club, in coordination with the Office of the First Lady of Peru and the Home of the Beatitudes, delivered 48 wheelchairs and 45 boxes of spare parts to the Ministry of Health to be distributed to hospitals where COVID patients are being treated.

Our Rotary Club of San Borja Sur, with its Dreams on Wheels Program, provides mobility to people with disabilities, but in this emergency situation that our country is experiencing we are giving wheelchairs to the emergency areas of COVID Hospitals.

In this period 2019-2020 we have distributed more than 750 wheelchairs in different regions of Peru. In the 11 years of our Rotary club, with the Dreams on Wheels Program, we have given mobility to more than 6,500 people.



Our thanks to Wheelchair Foundation, a global organization that has donated 1,150,000 wheelchairs in more than 156 countries worldwide. We also thank the donors Chair the Love, Rotary International Districts 7570 and 7670, and Chair the Hope.

Long live El Perú, united we will end the Coronavirus!
