A MESSAGE FROM DAVID BEHRING



Dear Friends,

As we prepare to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Wheelchair Foundation in a few months at Galas in Florida and California, I would like to take this opportunity to reflect back on some of our key accomplishments. First and foremost we have successfully delivered over 1,200,000 wheelchairs to 156 countries. When we started the foundation, there were very few organizations delivering wheelchairs and most of them were doing less than 500 each year. By collaborating with governments and thousands of organizations across the world to properly ensure the manufacturing, importation, delivery and distribution of these wheelchairs, we greatly increased the awareness of disability and the importance of these mobility devices. In 2000 when we began our humanitarian work you rarely saw wheelchairs in many of these countries and their governments really had no idea how many of their citizens lacked the mobility to attend school, visit the local market or go to work. As our longtime supporter Don Routh often says, "Mobility is a human right." We couldn't agree more and pride ourselves on helping others receive that right.

Wars and natural disasters are unlikely to abate in the future; in fact, I suspect the opposite will happen. Populations across the world are getting older and we are living longer. That demographic will undoubtedly require more mobility devices. While certain diseases like polio (thanks to all of our Rotarians) have been basically eradicated, many other diseases will still make it extremely difficult for part of our population to move on their own. We now offer specialized wheelchairs to help those individuals.

Young people will play a critical role in the future of our world and we need to be role models to them by demonstrating the importance of community service. We have always encouraged students to go on wheelchair distributions through our "From the Heart" program so they can develop empathy and understanding for people less fortunate than ourselves.

The smiles, handshakes and hugs we receive from the recipients, their family members and friends are concurrently impossible to measure and forget. We eagerly look forward to them on every wheelchair trip.



ROTARY CLUB OF MARION, NORTH CAROLINA ON A MISSION TO PROVIDE HOPE, FREEDOM AND MOBILITY IN UKRAINE

When the Russians came into his village he went out to check on his wife, who was coming back from the local village market, and he was shot in the hand, the shoulder and the lower leg - which was amputated due to the extent of the wound. He has no insurance and no way to resume his work. He is bed bound until he gets a prosthesis. Our wheelchair is getting him up and out a bit , and he was very, very grateful . s a retired 29-year Army officer and a veteran of Desert Storm, I have closely followed the war in Ukraine. Over the last 20 years I have been involved in a dozen wheelchair distributions with the Wheelchair Foundation into third world countries, but never one in an active war zone. Our team of six delivered 240 wheelchairs and 321 combat tourniquets to Kyiv, Ukraine, August 13 – 26.

First, I would like to give you some background on how this distribution came about. It began on April 3, 2022. I had not watched the CBS television show 60-Minutes in over five years. They were filming in Ukraine, and I wanted to see what was taking place. It showed Charles Pelly filming in a city hospital that Russia had attacked.

A young couple had brought their four-year-old daughter wrapped in a blood-soaked light blue blanket. She dies! The mother was kissing the child and placing the blanket over her head. The event did two things: it brought me to tears, and it made me determined to do something to help the people of Ukraine.

The next day the incoming president of our Rotary club called and asked if I would support packing100,000 meals for Ukraine. Our club had packaged 100,000 for Ukraine about six months earlier. I said "No, but I would support 1,000,000 meals." We selected a retired Army colonel to head up the project. He put together a multi-district grant with three other districts to accomplish the \$170,000 project. Mission accomplished!

ROTARIANS IN ACTION

I have had the honor of being affiliated with the Wheelchair Foundation for over 20 years. I cannot say enough good and positive things about this incredible organization! Originally, the plan was to take these wheelchairs to El Salvador. One morning a little over a year ago I told my wife that I am not supposed to go to Central America. She asked, "where are you going?" I said, "Ukraine." We have been married for 56 years, and she knows I have always viewed life as an adventure. She always tells me as I walk out the door, "Frank be safe, and come back home."

To begin with you need money and the right kind of people to do a mission like this. I contacted a friend who had been a part of our 2019 distribution in Peru. When I told him the plan, he said he was in, and sent a substantial check that started the money-raising aspect. The second member of the team was one of my tentmates during Desert Storm. This was his seventh distribution with me. Rounding out the team was a doctor, a linguist that spoke five Slovak languages, and two gentlemen that had made multiple trips to Ukraine on humanitarian operations.

The father, son and grandson were out in the courtyard of their low-income state housing apartment when a cruise missile was intercepted by the Ukranian air defense system. The wings of the incoming missile fell and killed their son and four-year-old grandson, and took Olax's leg. They were devastated and extremely depressed, as you can see above. He has no chance of receiving a prosthesis either, so he was very grateful to receive a wheelchair. After it became apparent the mission was a go, the first team member flew to Ukraine with his wife and daughter to lay the groundwork. Another member of our team, who had made multiple trips to Ukraine, provided him with a Rotary contact in Lviv with a warehouse. The problem was it was not large enough to accommodate 240 wheelchairs. Our goal was to push the wheelchairs as far forward to the east, toward the Russian border, as possible. That gentleman referred him to another Rotarian in Kyiv who was a Past District Governor with a much larger warehouse. Sergi was a Godsend to the mission with his warehouse, getting our schedule together, and providing qualified recipients.

We did experience some obstacles along the way, but an obstacle is nothing more than an opportunity to excel. The Rotary Club of Marion, North Carolina raised \$28,000, which was matched by the Wheelchair Foundation. The order was placed, and it took about six months to manufacture and transport the wheelchairs to the warehouse in Kyiv. Our team began arriving on August 13th and our last members were out by August 26th. Even though there were several daily air raid sirens, we did not catch a single round. However, on the 27th Putin sent in over 100 missiles and drones. One missile hit a military cadet barracks killing 48.



We distributed wheelchairs in homes and hospitals to civilians and soldiers. I can say this without a shadow of doubt; I love the Ukrainian people. Their will to fight is second to none!

Before I became involved in this distribution, Ukraine was a country at war halfway around the world. Once you can wrap your five senses around the situation it becomes personal. You learn their pain and what it is like to be vulnerable to daily attacks. You experience their pain. Now, these are my friends we are talking about.

We cannot allow Ukraine to fall! I will go back for additional distributions. If anyone in an organization, a Rotary club or district wants more information, you can get my contact information through the Wheelchair Foundation.

ew and seasoned Wheelchair Foundation volunteers traveled with us to Honduras July 13-20, 2024. Among our dedicated travelers were: San Francisco International School student Tallulah McKennon-Peterson and her mother Wendy, San Ramon Valley High School student Abby Roden and her mother Angie, Dougherty Valley High School student Amber Kaplenko and her mother Diana, who is a teacher at Windemere Middle School, Dougherty Valley High School student Max Duan and his father Shane, who is also a member of Dougherty Valley Rotary Club, student alum Abby Fried, and of course our school program founders Don and Josh Routh and our coordinator, Heather Schomaker.

We are so grateful to our longtime partners in Tegucigalpa, Honduras: Club Rotario de Tegucigalpa. A special thank you to Ramon Sarmiento, Edgardo Yescas, Francisco Manuel Samayoa, and Jose Euceda for their hours of planning to make our week in Honduras so successful!









Our group personally delivered over 180 wheelchairs at larger distribution events, individual homes, and care facilities. One particularly impactful experience was a visit to an orphanage for young children and the disabled. This orphanage is run by nuns who devote their lives to the loving care of those who do not have a family or their families are unable to care for them. Having to care for a disabled child for many in developing countries is a financial burden that is impossible for them to support. Some have no choice but to leave their loved one in the care of someone else.

We were also struck by the number of recipients who were in need of a wheelchair because they were victims of gun violence. We counted 8 individuals who requested a wheelchair due to a debilitating injury caused by a gunshot.







CLOCKWISE FROM ABOVE LEFT: >>> These two women live in a home for the disabled run by Nuns. The home is in a known gang area, however the gangs leave the Nuns alone out of respect. The woman victim of gang rape at the age of 14, then again at 15, when she was beaten so badly she suffered brain damage and permenent disabilty. Both were abandoned at the home by their families because they could not care for them. Their stories moved many to tears, but when the woman in blue noticed their distress she told our group, "Don't cry for me. I am okay, and I am happy here." >>> Two weeks prior She was already having trouble walking and her labor and delivery pushed her to full paralysis. She arrived with her husband and son, in need a a wheelchair. >>> BELOW: >>> This young man was working at his family's dairy shop when a gang robbery took the lives of his father, brother, uncle and cousin. He suffered a gunshot wound which left him paralyzed from the waist down. He was so appreciative of his new wheelchair that he returned the following day with cheese for our group as a "thank you." >>> 53-year-old Ray was injured on a fishing trip when a friend's young son fell overboard. Ray jumped into the ocean to save the boy and his leg got caught in their fishing net resulting in an injury requiring the amputation of his leg. >>>

Like on the other trips we made, we helped young and old, girls, women, boys and men. Our experienced team was able to efficiently and quickly assemble the specialized Kanga wheelchairs desperately needed by those suffering from cerebral palsy. Unique for our team was helping children whose limbs were burned off when they crawled into open cooking fires as babies. You have not seen a smile until you have seen their smiles as they waited to be lifted from their skateboard, on which they traveled, into their wheelchairs. There was no greater excitement when they were finally sitting in them.

n early May, Charli Butterfield and I traveled to South Africa to help distribute wheelchairs to those in need who couldn't possibly afford one. Each distribution is unique, and each one leaves you with memories to last a lifetime.

One distribution was organized by the local Rotarians at a school for children with various challenges. Bus load after bus load of recipients arrived, and one by one, deserving individuals were seated in shiny red wheelchairs. A young man who had just received his wheelchair pulled me aside and told me of his plans to start a support group for others in his situation. Already he was giving back to his community!

Three days were spent doing home deliveries for 23 people who were unable to travel to a distribution site. Through the generosity of HEDCO, and with the incredible assistance of Life Form Taxidermy and Warriors on Wheelchairs, we bumped along dirt roads in 4WD vehicles, at times physically carrying a wheelchair down narrow trails.

We met a young girl who, immediately upon receiving her wheelchair, wanted to explore her newfound mobility. With fierce determination, she adamantly refused any assistance as she rolled herself around her yard.

hat a life-changing year 2024 has been, partnering with the Wheelchair Foundation and embarking on an unforgettable journey. A special dedication to Derek Jernstedt, Executive Director of the HEDCO Foundation along with the Board of Directors of the Wheelchair Foundation.
