
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A MESSAGE FROM DAVID BEHRING



Dear Friends,

When my late father, Ken Behring, announced on June 13, 2000 that he was launching a non-profit organization to distribute wheelchairs across the world in an effort to end immobility, we had no idea that we would be celebrating the Wheelchair Foundation's Silver Anniversary entitled "Journey of Hope" in 2025. And celebrate we did – with a large Gala at the Blackhawk Museum featuring Emmy Award winning television anchor Dan Ashley, music by the "Camp Jeff All Stars Rock and Roll Band", a fabulous Live Auction and a terrific keynote speaker, Matthew Scott, who is a two-time Paralympic Gold Medalist in wheelchair basketball. It was our most successful Gala ever and raised over \$300,000 for wheelchairs.

As I look back at our accomplishment of providing wheelchairs to 1,220,000 people while also helping the ten million caregivers for those individuals, we want to express our deepest gratitude to our thousands of donors, volunteers and in-country organizations that made this all possible. Their dedication and compassion made our job so much easier and we wish that we could personally thank each one of them.

The recipients of our wheelchairs are the heart and soul of our mission. It is their smiles, tears of joy, embraces and handshakes that always leave an indelible impression on us. They teach us about strength and resilience in dealing with hardship, love of family and community support. We look forward to our role in improving lives and creating global friendship and hope that our founder, Ken Behring, is looking down on us with the same huge smile he had while giving someone a wheelchair.

he newly established Wheelchair Foundation Florida team is closing out the spring season with an impressive list of accomplishments. The team – consisting of Scott Ford, Karla Granados and Jose Rosario – established their new storefront at 2400 East Commercial Boulevard, in Fort Lauderdale. From that location, the trio has been working hard to expand the Wheelchair Foundation brand throughout the regional market, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. With 2025 being the Wheelchair Foundation's 25th

anniversary year, the Florida team celebrated this momentous achievement with a gala event at the iconic Fontainebleau Hotel in beautiful Miami Beach, Florida. With nearly 240 attendees dressed in their finest "Tropical Formal" attire, nearly \$500,000 was raised....and the goal of providing 2,500 wheelchairs for the Dominican Republic was exceeded! Later this year, 2,900 wheelchairs will be delivered to the DR. This amazing event created many new relationships which will create lasting impact for those in need of mobility.

25th ANNIVERSARY



With all of that momentum, in April the Sanibel-Captiva Rotary Club held their sixth annual "Howard S. Danner, Jr., Wheels for Wheels Cycling Challenge", to raise support for sending wheelchairs to Ecuador. More than \$30,000 was the final total for that event. The club has raised over \$132,000 to provide more than 1,400 wheelchairs to people in need of mobility. Amazing partners!

Scott and Karla have been active with Rotary clubs in Weston, Florida and Ft. Lauderdale, respectively. Scott has been working closely with donors from the Weston club to write a grant through the Rotary International Foundation. An identified need for wheelchairs has been documented by the Rotary Club of Grand Bahama, in the Bahama Islands. This \$30,000 grant request looks to be very favorably vetted and received by the funders. An update on this grant will be shared in the next newsletter.




During his lengthy career working in Spanish language media, Jose Rosario has established professional relationships with many international radio and television personalities, as well as governmental leaders from numerous countries. In the last two months Jose connected Wheelchair Foundation with Ambassadors, Consul Generals and political leaders from several Latin American countries and cities throughout Miami-Dade County. Due to Jose's connections, Scott was able to speak directly with the Dominican Ambassador to the US, on the day of the tragic building collapse in Santo Domingo, killing more than 200 people. Our expression of solidarity and shared grief at the devastation was received and appreciated by the Ambassador. These are the types of new relationships which will help promote our brand and bolster our mission. Finally, Karla and Scott worked with local donors who provided a container of wheelchairs to be distributed throughout Broward County, Florida. We are grateful to the Marvin H. Weiner Foundation for their generosity, and ongoing commitment.

ROTARY CLUBS DELIVER MOBILITY ASSISTANCE IN BOLIVIA

n October 2024, a dedicated group of approximately 20 Rotarians from Rotary Districts 7570 and 7610 Virginia embarked on a mission to Bolivia, led by Past District Governor Woody Saddler and his wife Lori. The Rotary Club of Santa Cruz de la Sierra, our valued mobility partner, organized the agenda and distributions among many other tasks. They were with us every day, joking, laughing, and crying. International friendship at its best.

The initial distribution occurred in Santa Cruz de la Sierra at Cerniquem – a center established by the Rotary Club Santa Cruz de la Sierra specializing in the treatment and rehabilitation of burn victims. Subsequently, the team traveled to the Chiquitania region, known for its Jesuit heritage, including historic churches and a vibrant musical tradition stemming from the Jesuits' emphasis on music education. This area is renowned for the Archivo Musical de Chiquitos, a repository of over 5,000 Baroque-era musical manuscripts preserved since the colonial period. On the long bus rides, it never got boring as whole shawls, hats and other items were knitted.

In the towns of Chiquitos, we happily gave to children and adults, many of whom arrived carried by caregivers or using dilapidated mobility aids. The direct involvement of U.S. and Bolivian Rotarians along with the Wheelchair Foundation underscored the profound impact of mobility on individuals and their families. For caregivers and families, it alleviates physical strain and emotional stress, fostering a more inclusive environment. This mission exemplifies Rotary's commitment to service and the enduring power of mobility to change lives.

PAUL & DEBBIE KAVANAUGH PARTNER WITH CILSA ARGENTINA TO DISTRIBUTE WHFFI CHAIRS

n November 2024, the sun-drenched city of Mendoza, Argentina, nestled at the foothills of the Andes Mountains, became the backdrop for a profound act of kindness. Their dedication to humanitarian efforts spans over 15 years, including support for a girls' school in Cambodia and numerous global aid initiatives. Wheelchair Foundation collaborated with CILSA, a prominent Argentine non-profit organization specializing in mobility and social integration. CILSA's extensive network and deep understanding of the community were instrumental in identifying beneficiaries and facilitating the logistics of the distribution.

The distribution events were marked by a series of poignant moments that highlighted the profound impact of the Kavanaughs' generosity. Specialized wheelchairs, tailored to meet the unique requirements of the recipient ensured not just mobility but also comfort and dignity. Throughout the distributions, Paul and Debbie engaged personally with each recipient, listening to their stories, sharing in their hopes, and offering words of encouragement. Their genuine compassion and hands-on involvement resonated deeply with the community.

A Journey of Impact: Wheelchair Distribution in Lima, Peru

n November 2024, 6 Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Pleasanton and one spouse embarked on a meaningful journey to Lima and Arequipa, Peru under the leadership of Past Rotary President Dick Stafford. Their mission was simple yet profound: to provide mobility and dignity to those in need through the gift of wheelchairs. Working alongside the Rotary Club of San Borja Sur, which had coordinated the logistics, beneficiary selection, and daily agenda, the visiting Rotarians immersed themselves in a deeply moving experience.

The first distribution took place in a very elegant setting—inside the office building of the mayor. The contrast was striking: the grandeur of the architecture and the raw emotion of those receiving a life-changing gift. Each wheelchair delivered in that space represented newfound independence, bringing relief not only to the recipients but also to the families who had long struggled to care for them.

The following days took the team beyond the city's wellmanicured streets and into the outlying districts of Lima, where the reality of daily life was far more challenging. Unpaved roads, makeshift homes, and limited resources painted a picture of perseverance in the face of hardship. But nothing was more powerful than one particular home visit—a moment that would forever remain in the hearts of those who witnessed it. Navigating a steep, unpaved hill, the Rotarians carried a wheelchair into a humble shack where a mother was raising several children. One of her sons, unable to walk, had never had the opportunity to move freely on his own. When the team presented him with a wheelchair, his reaction was unforgettable. In that tiny space, surrounded by his family, the boy leaned forward and, with no hesitation, wrapped his arms around Rotarian Bill Wheeler in a heartfelt embrace. It was a pure expression of gratitude, a reminder of why they had traveled so far—to make moments like this possible.

Through this journey, the partnership between the Rotary Club of Pleasanton, the Wheelchair Foundation, and the Rotary Club of San Borja Sur proved that mobility is more than just movement—it is freedom, dignity, and hope



y wife Helen and I have known the Behring family since 2004. Since then, we've been honored to help organize multiple fundraisers and wheelchair distribution trips to Vietnam with David Behring and the Wheelchair Foundation.

In February 2024, the Wheelchair Foundation partnered with Viet Dreams to host a powerful fundraising event featuring Vietnamese diva singer Y Lan and top designer Le Thanh Hoa. Thanks to our generous supporters, we raised enough funds to send two full containers of wheelchairs to Vietnam.



As always, David entrusted us to coordinate on the ground. Our trusted partner, Travis Tran of Sapio Vietnam, led the local efforts—working with the Red Cross to identify recipients, secure permits, and arrange logistics for transport and distribution. His team also organized all domestic travel and accommodations for our volunteers.

Every trip presents unique challenges. This time, Typhoon Trami hit northern Vietnam, causing severe flooding and shutting down major ports, including Hai Phong—where our wheelchairs were supposed to arrive. Thanks to Travis and his determined team, who literally camped near the port entrance, we managed to retrieve the wheelchairs intact.





During this mission, we visited six key areas: Go Vap (near Ho Chi Minh City), Caritas of Xuan Loc, Ninh Thuan, Hue, Vinh Phuc, and Thai Binh. These regions are among the poorest and most remote in Vietnam. Some required 3–4 hour bus rides, but our team remained committed and upbeat, knowing each wheelchair not only helps one person, but eases the burden for entire families.

We met people living with unimaginable hardship—disabled by Agent Orange, traffic accidents, or disease—some surviving on less than \$50 a month, in small huts designed so they don't need to move far. Every story





brought tears, yet also showed hope and gratitude. These moments remind us why this work matters so deeply.

We thank the Behrings, the Wheelchair Foundation, its donors, and our incredible volunteers. For many Vietnam veterans who join us, these trips offer healing and a chance to see a vibrant, welcoming Vietnam beyond the memories of war.
